Hot Book Summer!

As the school year winds down, CLiF's Summer Readers program ramps up! Over the summer months, our energetic CLiF presenters will visit with thousands of children at events across Vermont and New Hampshire, sharing stories and hosting book giveaways.

Last year CLiF hosted 108 storytelling sessions for kids at risk of experiencing summer learning loss, and gave away over 18,000 brand-new books. Our goal is to serve even more young readers this summer, and to build enthusiasm around summer reading by providing a wide selection of books at each CLiF event for children to choose and keep.

In May, storyteller **Simon Brooks** hosted CLiF's first summer event for the NH Foster Parent Association's annual family celebration, which was held in person for the first time since 2019. After sharing stories, he invited children forward to choose books to keep.

"Each young person there stepped up to the four large tables exploding with the color of hundreds of brand new books," Brooks recalled. "Children eagerly picked over them, choosing two of their favorites, and talking about the books with their friends."

"Even though I do this work all year round, there's always something special, something magical about watching kids pick out books that don't need to be returned, books that they can write their name in, and, sometimes, begin a collection for the first time for their own library," he added.

We look forward to seeing the familiar faces of long standing CLiF partners this summer, as well as welcoming a cluster of new summer programs to the CLiF network! Together with our partners, we'll continue our mission to combat summer learning loss and keep kids throughout Vermont and New Hampshire engaged with reading during their time away from school.

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Make An Impact

In-person visits from authors and illustrators. Creative writing workshops. Family literacy events. And, of course, book giveaways! These are just a few of the initiatives supported by your gift to CLiF.

Best Friend Books

Do you have a favorite book you return to time and time again? Maybe it's a picture book or a cherished chapter book, and as you rely on a best friend, you can rely on these books for their wisdom, substance, and support.

This is the concept behind education consultant **Lester L. Laminack**'s workshop, "When Books Become Best Friends:
One Book/Many Visits," one of three engaging literacy
sessions presented during CLiF's free annual Community
Literacy Conference in March 2023.

Laminack defines a "best friend book" as one in a mindfully chosen collection that educators and caregivers return to over and over to teach specific concepts.

When first introducing students to a "best friend book," he emphasizes the importance of reading aloud without interruption as a "gift to the listeners." That means simply letting listeners absorb the story, without front-loading, pre-teaching or stopping for questions.

Subsequent readings will allow for deeper analysis and learning, as the "friendship" between book and listener develops, and the listener's comprehension of the material grows.

"Perhaps the most important message that comes from our reading aloud to [children] is one that says you are worth the time this will take.

When a teacher reads aloud, it is a bonding between the teacher, the children, the books, and the act of reading.

That in itself is worthy."

CLiF's Big Night

On a warm April night, some 250 friends of CLiF gathered at the Hanover Inn (Hanover, NH) to celebrate the organization's 25th anniversary; bid farewell to retiring Executive Director **Duncan McDougall**; and welcome new Executive Director **Laura Rice**.

The night's speakers included CLiF Board Chair **Mark Beams** and Vice Chair **Posie Taylor**; **Leah Whelan**, principal of Canaan (NH) Elementary School, a 2022-2023 CLiF Year of the Book partner; Laura and Duncan. Additional CLiF "VIPs" were featured in a video montage honoring Duncan.

In recognition of Duncan's unwavering commitment to the well-being of his staff over the years, the Board also announced the creation of the **Duncan McDougall Staff Development & Enrichment Fund**, intended to provide CLiF staffers with expanded professional development and wellness opportunities.

Apart from a 4-year-old guest's constructive criticism regarding the venue's lack of bounce houses, the gathering was deemed a rousing success by all who attended.

A Mountaintop Finale

To cap off their 2022-23 CLiF Year of the Book grant, Bethlehem (NH) Elementary School launched a reading challenge with an enticing reward. "Read to the Top of the Cog!" tracked students' literary successes, and culminated with a momentous schoolwide trip to the summit of Mount Washington via the Cog Railway.

In keeping with the theme, CLiF presenter **Eric Pinder** visited the school to discuss his book *Cat in the Clouds*, inspired by his time

working as a weather observer atop Mount Washington. Principal **Sue Greenlaw** said the visit added another layer of excitement to the field trip, while connecting it with literacy.

"I think being able to connect the power of reading and writing to a special opportunity like this solidifies the connection for kids," Greenlaw said. "Becoming lifelong readers is our goal for our students and this will certainly support that goal."

Kudos to the educators who provided these students with an unforgettable experience, while teaching about the power of community, reading and a special local mountain.

Literacy through Songwriting

CLiF presenters use many creative techniques to connect with children through literacy, songwriting among them. Vermont-based musician and CLiF presenter **Jon Gailmor** guides students through writing and performing original songs, believing songwriting helps tease out inner stories. He describes it as a collaborative process, where "fledgling songwriters brainstorm, listen to each other's ideas, appreciate their classmates' perspectives, and end up with a collective piece of beauty."

Gailmor says literacy principles are embedded throughout the songwriting experience.

"The emphasis is on vivid writing, so the listener can picture what the composers are singing about. Discovering the magic of our language is a revelation for the children, which becomes a skill to enhance their lives forever."

Students—whether in preschool or middle school—learn to use the best words in order to make their compositions become lyrics. They also learn about rhyme, rhythm, phonetics (sounds), emotions, and word meaning. Gailmor maintains that children naturally like to make up songs; we just need to encourage curiosity and let them lead the way. Ultimately, it's about joy and expression and helping children find what Gailmor sings in one of his songs, "the power of the word in my brain and soul."

Please Note Our Change of Address

CLiF officially has a new home! After 25 years of operation out of founder **Duncan McDougall**'s garage, we moved to our new headquarters in Waterbury Center, VT this April. Located just two miles away from our former site, it feels like a new world of opportunities has been opened to our organization.

During the design/build process, careful consideration went into making our new building as environmentally friendly as possible.

"Everyone at CLIF cares very deeply about the well-being of children, and that extends to the kind of world we will be leaving them," Duncan explained. "Climate change will have a significant impact on future generations, and when designing the new CLiF Headquarters we wanted to reduce our carbon footprint as much as possible."

According to **Jesse Remick**, project manager at Black River Design in Montpelier, VT, CLiF HQ was "designed with an eye toward the future with its energy use. The building is 100 percent fossil fuel-free with goals of becoming net zero."

It is anticipated that a solar array installed on the roof of the building will produce enough power to offset CLiF's electrical usage, including hot water, heating, air conditioning, ventilation and two electric vehicle charging stations.

"It will take a full year of our lovely seasons in Vermont to see how the solar electrical

production matches the usage of the building, but by this time next year we hope to call the building net zero," Remick said.

Our thanks to the many people who helped bring this dream to life. We are grateful to our architects at **Black River Design**; and our builders at **Naylor & Breen**, who have been with us on each step of this journey. Special thanks to the members of our Building Committee and Building Campaign Committee, particularly **John Vogel**, **Posie Taylor** and **Kathy McGowan** for their hard work and leadership. Thank you to **Trevor Luce** for consulting on and setting up our technology. And, our deepest gratitude to **Duncan** for spearheading efforts on all fronts with his signature optimism and dedication.

Two-Sentence Tales

In February, CLiF held its first-ever Two-Sentence Writing Contest, challenging entrants to tell an original story about winter using only-you guessed it-two sentences. Open to all Vermont and New Hampshire children aged 12 and under, it was free to enter, with prizes for top entries.

We were thrilled to receive **763 entries** from kids across the Twin States. Seventeen different schools sent in submissions, as did many homeschoolers, public librarians, parents, grandparents and guardians.

Though brief in length, the stories were long on creativity. Entries were separated into three age groups: 6 and under, 7 to 9 years, and 10 to 12 years. Our winners received a five-book library, curated according to their interests, while runners-up each received one book.

We are grateful to CLiF presenter **Jason Chin** for recording a congratulatory video message for all entrants; and to CLiF presenter **Simon Brooks**, who created audio recordings of our winning entries.

Plans are already in the works for next year's Two-Sentence Contest. Stay tuned!

Building Community Through Literacy

CLiF created the annual Community Building grant in response to the division and discord experienced by the country following the 2016 election. The grant uses reading and writing to bring people together, while sparking engagement within communities.

Fletcher Free Library in Burlington, VT was one of five sites awarded the \$1,000 grant this spring. The library recently hosted "Telling a People's Story: African-American Children's Literature," a traveling 12-panel exhibit of illustrations from African-American children's picture books, along with a robust schedule of related events. The CLiF grant helped support a visit from James Ransome, an acclaimed author and illustrator of over 70 books, who delivered an all-ages talk for the general public, as well as special presentations for students from area schools.

While speaking with students, Ransome, the winner of the 2023 Children's Literacy Legacy Award, shared personal insights into

his creative process, and revealed that his literary inspirations as a child included comic books and *Mad* Magazine.

In connection with the event, Fletcher Free Library raised funds to purchase a selection of books by Black authors and illustrators for students to choose and keep.

CLIF was thrilled to support this community event spotlighting the important topics of representation and diversity in the children's book world.








CLiF presenter Jim Arnosky leads a Year of the Book event at Enfield (NH) Village School.
