

This is a location that is used to help regulate students' behaviors, build relationships, and provide opportunities for students to engage with literature.





Teaching is my passion, and I thrive on finding ways to make learning come to life for my students. My energy is renewed each year when I build new relationships with my students and families and find new ways to meet each student's diverse needs. A core belief of mine is that education needs to be engaging to be meaningful, and nothing is more self-rewarding than having my students excited to walk into my classroom and learn how to read!

## **Meet Daryl Seitchik**

I'm a cartoonist and teacher living in Vermont. As a child, I loved to write and illustrate stories. It wasn't until college that I discovered comics, which fused writing and drawing into a magical new language. Eventually, I realized I didn't just want to draw comics, but to teach them, so I now teach comics at schools, libraries and arts centers all over New England.

My favorite thing about teaching kids is that I don't really have to teach them. Kids are natural cartoonists, and even the ones still learning how to read can write with pictures. The ones who only draw stick figures still make them say or do things no stick figure has ever said or done before. The kids I work with constantly inspire me.

For example, I'm currently working on a graphic novel whose original concept was born in comics class. I was live-drawing, and a student requested bunnies. I drew them on the moon, which we decided was made of cheese, and then we named the bunnies after different cheeses. Now the moon bunnies regularly appear in my classes, and some students think they are real. I'm excited to make them even more real in this book.

We often talk about how comics appeal to reluctant readers, but they can also appeal to reluctant writers. I've witnessed so many kids who struggle with spelling not let that stop them from making pages of comics with speech bubbles and narration, because they have a story they want to tell.

## **Award Boosts Summer Reading**

One of the primary vendors through whom CLiF purchases new, high-quality books for our giveaways is First Book, a Washington, DC-based nonprofit, whose mission is to ensure quality education access for all children in North America. As a longtime partner of the organization, CLiF receives discounts on books through the First Book Marketplace, a curated selection of titles with a special emphasis on diversity and inclusion.

Even with generous discounts, our much-loved book giveaways represent a significant expense for CLiF, particularly during the busy summer months, when the CLiF Summer Readers program is in full swing. Because each child who attends a CLiF event leaves with two new books to take home, we must constantly replenish our library shelves to ensure we can continue to offer a wide range of titles. This May, we received a very welcome surprise when First Book awarded CLiF a \$20,000 grant toward summer reading materials.

According to First Book representative Maggie Osborn, "This grant was made through a generous private donation to First Book and will support the distribution of books to CLiF partner organizations. First Book is delighted to partner with CLiF in providing children access to new, diverse books this summer."

## **Early Literacy Fun**

This spring, CLiF partnered with the St. Johnsbury Athenaeum, one of the most beautiful and historic libraries in Vermont's Northeast Kingdom, to highlight our shared focus on early literacy for children from birth to five. As a recipient of CLiF's Community Literacy Grant, the library chose to host a Literacy Appreciation Day with CLiF founder and storyteller Duncan McDougall.

On the day of the event, 135 children, teachers, and parents filled the upstairs of the library for a lively and engaging morning of stories and songs that included "The Wheels on the Bus," "Pete the Cat," and other favorites. Inspiring children to love reading at a young age, and creating early access to high-quality books are key elements of CLiF's mission.

"The event was enjoyed by all, and every child left with two beautiful new books to read," said youth services librarian Becky Hatfield. "This special event helps us to reinforce the link between our childcare outreach program and the library and ensure that our youngest patrons feel welcome. We are so grateful to CLiF for making this day possible."

## **Sky Stories**

In March, CLiF held our second annual Two-Sentence Story Contest. In a nod to April's total eclipse, young writers in New Hampshire and Vermont were challenged to "tell us a story that takes place in the sky."

The entries poured in-over 900 of them, when all was said and done. Though brief in length, there was no shortage of imagination. There were leprechauns, unicorns, bad guys and heroes. Eagles soared, and clouds

billowed. Mythical tigers explored constellations, while comets streaked across the universe. Most wrote in prose; a few in verse. Some chose to add illustrations: others let their words stand alone.

Though it was no easy task, we finally winnowed our pool of stories down to eight winners across four age groups: kindergarten and under; grades one and two; grades three and four; and grades five and six. Each of our winners received a five-book library curated to their interests.

"If it weren't for John's literally countless hours of effort and oversight on the project, I truly don't know if we would have our building," said Rice.

Created in 1997, the Red Clover Book Award is designed for children in kindergarten through fourth grade, and is intended to foster awareness, understanding and appreciation of the picture book. Each year, thousands of Vermont schoolchildren read the nominated picture books, and vote for their favorite in the spring.




