

Brainstorming the Two-Sentence "Love" Story

To prepare:

- Print brainstorming graphic organizer
- Cut into four cards
- Explain what each icon represents
 - ♣ = Something I love to do
 - a = A place I love to go
 - \circ **\mathbf{Q}** = Someone I love to see/spend time with
 - 💙 = Wild card: anything at all that I love!

Partner Brainstorming: Go Fish! 🞣 For Writing Ideas

- 1. In pairs, each child holds four cards with the images facing them, so their partner cannot see them.
- 2. One child selects a card from their partner's hand and then describes something they love and why they love it.

Example: if the child draws the "person" card, they might describe their favorite aunt and what they love about her.

- 3. The player lays the card down and the turn moves to their partner.
- 4. The round of play continues until all the cards have been laid down.
- 5. At the end of the round, each player identifies their favorite stories-one of their own, and one of their partners.

- 6. Each player takes several minutes to write a few words on the corresponding icon cards to remind them of the story.
- 7. Play resumes, with each partner taking turns drawing cards, telling stories, identifying favorites, and making notes.
- 8. This can continue until ideas are exhausted and players are ready to write.

Variation: In a round of play, have partners ask a follow-up question or two to learn more.

From Brainstorming to Writing

General approach

- Ask the child to circle a couple of favorite stories they've told
- Choosing one, the child responds to the prompt with a two-sentence story
- The child can create several responses, each one telling a different story
- Ask the child to share a favorite response or two with their Go Fish! partner, and discuss if there are describing words that could be added that would help a reader picture their thoughts more clearly

Choose a favorite and write it on the submission form

- The child can illustrate their story if they'd like to
- Add adult narration for clarity as needed for emergent and pre-emergent writers
