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Community Perspective

CLiF's Children of Incarcerated Adults (CHiA) program currently partners with five correctional facilities in Vermont and New Hampshire, providing resources and support to help incarcerated men and women stay connected with their children through literacy. In the recent letter excerpted below, an incarcerated father shares how the program has impacted his relationship with his son.

"Let me start by saying 'Thank You.' I have been incarcerated since 2013, so I am very familiar with your program and all you have afforded to us, not only at the prison, but also throughout [Vermont and New Hampshire]! This letter goes out to all of you who make these seminars possible!

My son absolutely loves receiving these books, as well as my nieces and nephews! I started off with the toddler books and have now moved all the way up to young adults. The wide variety that you provide is such a blessing! I truly can't thank you enough, you're all undoubtedly godsends!

The fact that you can take time and money, and come into these facilities and institutes. completely unbiased, opinion free, and humanize us when so many others out there are guick to judge, label and even disregard us! You've

enabled me to be a father who can stay active and relevant in my son's life. I never really knew my father, so being able to read the books I send home with him allows us to make the moments together that are absolutely priceless. Without CLiF, none of this would have been possible, so again, thank you so much!

My son used to struggle with his reading and his pronunciation, but since there is such a wide selection, I was able to find books that were suited to his needs, and now he is excelling in his reading. He's at an 8th/9th grade level, even though he's only in 6th grade! I owe that to your program, and all the donors who make that possible. Thank you so much!

I hope this program continues on indefinitely for the sake of parents and children everywhere! The donations you give and work you do is quite literally invaluable. So thank you from the bottom of my heart for being part of the glue that helps keep families together!"

Mat Heagerty CLIF PRESENTER SPOTLIGHT



Q: How did you initially connect with CLiF?

A: After a school visit I did in Southern Vermont a wonderful librarian suggested I reach out to CLiF, and I'm so glad I did! I love their mission and am seriously impressed by the quality and amount of books they are getting into kids' hands!

Q: You speak to children about the strengths of learning disabilities - can you share what some of those are?

A: There are so many strengths attached to neurodiversity! While my dyslexia may make reading and writing a slower process, it's gifted me with a greater visual understanding than most folks have. Dyslexics also have heightened creative thinking skills and enhanced empathy; both greatly help with my books. Folks with ADHD have hyperfocus and can be great at multitasking. Autistic folks often have a wonderful attention to detail, and amazing memories for their chosen interests. I could go on forever, but I believe the world is shaped by people who think outside the box, and neurodiverse kids think out of the box very well!

Q: How did your dyslexia impact your own literacy journey?

A: Reading came very, very late for me, and it came with a huge amount of struggle and embarrassment. With the help of some exceptional teachers and my awesome parents I eventually found tools and tricks that work best for me. Graphic novels were the first and biggest tool to help me with my reading. The smaller blocks of texts separated in word balloons, coupled with context clues of the visuals made reading so much more accessible to me.

Mat Heagerty is a graphic novelist and CLiF presenter who lives with his family in Vermont. He is dyslexic, and specializes in speaking to children about the strengths of learning disabilities. Mat's books include Lumberjackula, Martian Ghost Centaur, and Unplugged and Unpopular. Visit him online at matheagerty.com.

Q: Could you share a story or interaction that demonstrates what your message means to the kids you speak with?

A: I am so grateful to be welcomed into so many schools across America where I get to see kids who are struggling and really lacking confidence stand a little taller with pride as I talk about how special being neurodiverse is. I have had so many happy-cries in schools with students sharing their experiences. And a massive joy of my life is the emails I receive from parents or teachers after my visits sharing the positive impact my presentations had on their struggling students.

Q: Any tips for parents, caregivers and/or educators of children with dyslexia and other learning disabilities?

A: Keep that confidence up as best you can by exposing them to folk with other differences and differences like their own. And as best you can, lean into their strengths and interests. Reading will come eventually, but a foundation of confidence will make it come faster! Also, I just truly hope for all teachers and parents to have maximum respect and patience for all kids neurodiverse or not.



Q: Any new projects coming up that you would like to share?

A: My next book, Indoor Kid, will be out in October from Oni Press. It's drawn by Lisa DuBois-Thompson and is about a kid living in a sports-obsessed town who loves sports, but is awful at them, until he gets some magic sports abilities that he uses to stop some bullies and live out his sports dreams! I said sports a lot there! Sports!

To work at CLiF is to be surrounded by stories—on our shelves and in our communities. Thousands of new books pass through our giveaway library each month, bound for young readers across the region. (Read more about how we choose them on page 6.) Just as meaningful are the stories we hear from partners, presenters, donors, and families about CLiF's impact. 
Worldly Reads

QUALITY CONTROL



Each year, CLiF gives away over 50,000 new books to children in Vermont and

New Hampshire. At every giveaway, the goal is to provide a wide range of high-quality books that represent a diverse spectrum of genres, topics, and characters. Ensuring that our books meet this expectation means consistently monitoring our own shelves, gathering feedback from our partners, staying current on trends, and more. To streamline the process, the CLiF team recently developed a comprehensive rubric and a bi-annual audit system to better inform and calibrate our book orders. For example, data from our initial audit this past winter revealed that to meet our established benchmarks, we needed more non-fiction picture books, and additional early chapter books addressing social and emotional learning topics. We're pleased to have this effective system in place to guide us in making the best choices for the children and communities we serve.

COLLABORATIONS

SNAPSHOTS: If you've ever attended a CLiF event, vou've likely witnessed the energy, joy, and connection that fill the room. From the spark in a child's eye as they choose a new book, to the giggles and awe during a storytelling presentation, these moments matter. To better capture the full spirit of our work, CLiF has partnered with husband-and-wife team **Photos by Kintz** to document select events. Many of their photos appear throughout these pages, and we look forward to continued collaboration!

CLOSE TO HOME: In May, CLiF teamed up with Waterbury Public Library to host a facilitated discussion of Ken Cadow's Gather, the 2024 Vermont Reads selection. The conversation explored themes of rural life: resilience, class differences, addiction, housing and food insecurity, a deep relationship to the land, and the power of community. Free books were made available to community members ahead of the event, courtesy of Vermont Humanities. CLiF will also partner with the library for a "Touch-a-Truck" celebration in June, kicking off their summer reading program.

HAPPILY EVER AFTER: CLiF was pleased to provide **Good Beginnings of Central Vermont** with giveaway books for their annual "It Takes a Village" event on May 10. Good Beginnings representative Mindy Parisi shared with CLiF: "We decided to have children pick out a book as they entered the gym. It was so well received, and I can not thank you enough for this wonderful donation. It was so heartwarming to see children walking around with their books."

A WOMAN OF FEW WORDS: Author Vivian Kirkfield first launched her popular #50PreciousWords writing contest in 2016, challenging aspiring picture book authors to write a story for kids using only 50 words. Several years ago, she launched a companion #50PreciousWords Literacy Initiative, requesting that contest participants consider donating a children's book. She now partners with CLiF and Toadstool **Books** in Keene, NH to collect books for elementary schools served by our programs. Added bonus: Vivian recently joined CLiF's roster of professional presenters, adding her talents to an exceedingly talented pool!

PLAY BALL! Our thanks to the Vermont Lake Monsters, the collegiate baseball team based in Burlington, for inviting CLiF to share our work at one of their games this summer. Rick joined the Board in 2019, co-chaired the Governance Committee, and led


